# Presentation Quaich



“This quaich was presented to Ex Dean W R Montgomery on the Triennial trip to Aberdeen in 1993 by James Wyness the Lord Provost of Aberdeen.

On this trip Jean McCormack, the Provost of Perth was present and this was the first attendance by a representative of the Local Government since the reorganisation of 1974 which broke the tie established by the Burgh Reform act of 1832 of the Lord Deans position as a non elected member of the council.

A private train was arranged for the day. A civic reception was arranged in the county hall and Guildrymen enjoyed a lunch followed by a visit to Duthie Park winter gardens and a high tea served at the Pavilion on the Esplanade.”

Perth has become the first UK city to see resident urban beavers for several hundred years. Signs of activity have been seen on the River Tay at Moncreiffe Island and the North Inch.

Beavers had been hunted to extinction in Britain in the 16<sup>th</sup> Century for their fur, meat and scent glands.

The animals were reintroduced in Scotland in 2009 and are valued for their impact on ecosystems and ability as “natural engineers”.

Perth’s own St Johnstone Football Club won the Scottish League cup on Sunday 28<sup>th</sup> February 2021 for the first time in their history. Livingston were the opponents on the day and 1 goal by Shaun Rooney secured the trophy. Despite the pandemic and no fans allowed at Hampden Stadium, the city itself proudly displayed St Johnstone colours in windows and Perth Bridge was alight with blue and white. This title adds to the Club’s previous silverware of the Scottish Cup in 2014 and the challenge cup in 2007.
